OVERSEAS RESEARCH

Searching the 1929 Polish Business Directory

I am happy to announce that it is now possible to search for surnames through the entire 1929 Polish Business Directory. The credit for this goes to Logan Kleinwaks for performing the OCR (Optical Character Recognition) effort and developing the tools to make this process work, the purchase of higher quality scans of the 1929 Polish Business Directory by Jewish Records Indexing - Poland. Logan has added this Directory to his other databases at his Historical Directory Search Engine: http://www.kalter.org/search

A few years ago the OCR technology was not capable of analyzing the spotted and accented pages that we had from this Directory. Fortunately, we are now able to surmount these issues and thousands of pages have been processed.

After finding potential pages using Logan's Search Engine you can view copies of the Directory pages on the Jewish Records Indexing - Poland web site, hosted by JewishGen. Here are the basic steps:

- 1) Select the button to Search the 1929 Poland and Danzig Business Directory at: http://www.kalter.org/search and provide your search information and type.
- 2) Make a note of the resulting page numbers, which will appear below the search fields.
- 3) Go to the Jewish Records Indexing Poland 1929 Polish Business Directory Project web site at: http://www.jewishgen.org/jri-pl/bizdir/tableofcontents.htm and select the section that contains your page number. (Note that you may click on the Directory title on the page containing your search results to go to this web page.)
- 4) Enter your exact page number in the box at the top center of the screen and use either the "Click for Page" control or the "Right click HERE to save page ..." control at the top of the page.
 - 5) You can continue to navigate to additional pages from here.

With the transfer of the Survivors of the Shoah Foundation to the University of Southern California, online access to over 50,000 testimonies is now available at: www.usc.edu/schools/college/vhi/. Privacy restrictions on the Internet limit the search parameters to the use of given name with surname initial.

EASTERN EUROPEAN JEWISH RECORDS

The Jewish Family History Foundation is a website dedicated to the dissemination of

Jewish records from archives in Eastern Europe. This is accomplished by creating translated online databases and digitalized images of original documents. This website provides information suitable for genealogical and academic historical research. The focus is primarily on the Grand Duchy of the Lithuania-Kingdom of Poland Commonwealth in the 18th century; the early Russian Empire Revision Lists and 1765, 1784 census/tax lists of the Jewish communities. This area later became Belarus, Lithuania, Poland, and Ukraine, the ancestral homeland of 80 percent of the Jews alive in the world today. See www.jewishfamilyhistory.org

MONTREAL DIRECTORIES ON-LINE

City directories of Montreal from 1842-1940 are now online at http://bibnum2.bnquebec.ca/bna/lovell/index.html. The website is in French but the directories were published in English. From the early 1920s the directories include sections in French.

The directories include alphabetical directories of individuals and businesses, a street directory, and some classified advertisements. Some of these directories include a summary of conditions of the times, not only of the city, but also of Canada in general, and give information regarding who is holding various public offices - civic, federal and provincial. NEW FROM STEPHEN MORSE

The Stephen P. Morse site at http://stevemorse.org has added portals to the UK census for all years from 1851 to 1901 located at Ancestry.com. It already had portals to the 1901 and 1911 Canadian censuses. Also added is the use of the database of zabasearch.com to find information about persons, usually living, such as birth dates, telephone numbers and addresses. It is in the "Births, Deaths and Other Vital Records" section of the site. (From: Nu? What's Nu?)

MYFAMILY.COM INCLUDES CANADIAN 1911 CENSUS AND MORE

MyFamily.com, parent company of Ancestry.com, has launched a new Canadian family research Web site, Ancestry.ca, (http://www.ancestry.ca). It now includes more than 150 million names and the first and only online fully indexed 1911 Census of Canada.

The 1911 Census of Canada index includes information on each inhabitant of the country, including place of habitation, marital status, age, place of birth, religion, occupation, education, and more. It covers nine provinces, Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, and Saskatchewan, and two territories — the Yukon Territory and the Northwest Territories.

The site is a fee-for-service site. To view all the contents on Ancestry.ca, membership is CDN \$99.95/annually or CDN \$14.95/monthly. A pay-per-view option is also available for CDN \$5.95/10 views, 14 days. Members of Ancestry.com can view all Canadian content with a World Deluxe membership.

CANADIAN PASSENGER LISTS TO BE AVAILABLE IN MARCH



The National Archives Canada originally planned to start placing digitized images of passenger lists online by the end of 2005. The project has slipped to March. It will include almost every port of entry for the years 1865 to 1921. Currently there are no plans for the Archives to include a name index to these records. The Nanaimo Family History Society of British Columbia plans to index all passengers at Halifax and Quebec (Montreal is included in the Port of Quebec) from 1900 to 1921.

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ON-LINE BREMEN LISTS EXPANDED

In the April 25, 2004, issue of *Nu? What's New?* I reported that the Bremen Germany Chamber of Commerce planned to index extant emigration lists for that port city and had completed portions of the list. They have now completed 1920-1934, representing nearly 620,000 entries. Not all ships are present because some were lost. Eventually the group hopes to put all surviving lists through 1939 on the Internet. The site is located at http://www.schiffslisten.de/index_en.html

You can search the lists using a surname only or a portion of a surname. The system will then display all persons whose surname has the key letters supplied. Using the surname Weiss, the system displayed all names that had the consecutive characters w-e-i-s-s including Weiss, Schneeweiss, Schweiss, Serweiss, Stirnweiss, Weissenberg, Wessenberger, Weissenborn, Weissenbruch and others. There is no soundex search. Information provided includes name of the person, town of origin, ship, date of departure and name of the ship.

The site states that ships left Bremen/Bremerhaven for the United States, Canada and South America. Lists earlier than 1920 were systematically destroyed by officials who ran out of storage space. The surviving lists had been stowed in a salt mine during World War II together with other archival material. After the war, they were transferred by the Spring 2006

Russians to the Moscow Archives. In 1987 and 1990 the lists were given back to the Bremen Chamber of Commerce.

The project is a joint effort of the Bremen Chamber of Commerce and a Bremen society for family research called Maus. (From: Nu? What's Nu?)

SURVEY OF YIZKOR BOOKS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM IS PUBLISHED

From the Jewish Genealogical Society of Great Britain (JGSGB)

Jewish Memorial (Yizkor) Books in UK - Destroyed European Communities by Cyril Fox & Saul Issroff (ISBN 0-9537669-5-0) has been published by the Jewish Genealogical Society of Great Britain (London 2006 188 pages).

This book is a unique listing of approximately 1,000 yizkor books and *memorbücher* in 32 academic libraries in the United Kingdom.

The aim of this book is to keep alive the memory of the past and of the Holocaust, as it is recorded in these precious volumes. In addition, they are a valuable resource for genealogists seeking their roots.

A typical Yizkor Book is written in Yiddish or Hebrew (but many have English sections), and contains a history of the community, many pictures and photographs of buildings and people, and a list of those murdered by the Nazis.

A list of books translated or partly translated into English is given.

Localities such as country or place names are listed alphabetically. The original language(s) of each book are noted.

Bibliographic details about each entry, including the geographical co-ordinates of specific towns or villages are given (because many places have similar or even identical names)

Smaller places mentioned in yizkor books but not in the title of the book are listed.

A detailed introduction explains the historical origins, the significance and structure of yizkor books, the methods of compilation and the value to historians and genealogists.

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR JEWISH GENEALOGY OPENS IN JERUSALEM

The International Institute for Jewish Genealogy and Paul Jacobi Center opened this week. Located at the Jewish National and University Library at Givat Ram, Jerusalem,

the new Institute, a non-profit organization, has two main aims: (1) to engage in Jewish genealogical research and teaching at the university level and (2) to make Jewish Genealogy a recognized academic discipline within the realm of Jewish Studies.

The Institute is the only one of its kind in the Jewish world. It plans to operate on an interdisciplinary basis and also in a collaborative way with organizations engaged in aspects of Jewish genealogy. It will put a premium on innovative programs and projects of practical benefit to individual family historians.

Its establishment is the result of efforts over the last two years of an international Founding Committee, headed by Sallyann Sack, of Washington, DC. and Yosef Lamdan of Israel. Lamdan, a former Israeli ambassador to the Vatican, has been appointed as Director of the Institute.

One of its first projects is an academic symposium to be held in Jerusalem in September with a view to setting research and teaching priorities for the new Institute. Experts from the academic and genealogical world will be presenting papers.

MAJOR ADDITIONS TO JRI-POLAND DATABASE

Jewish Records Indexing-Poland is delighted to announce that new data has been processed and added to our database. Approximately 116,000 new entries for 67 towns were added.

JRI-Poland < www.jri-poland.org > now has indices to more than 2.7 million Polish Jewish records in its searchable database. Of the 67 towns, 13 are totally new to the JRI-Poland database.

Data for 14 Shtetl CO-OPS (volunteers indexing Mormon/LDS records) were added. Also, 26 more LDS microfilms have been fully indexed.

During the past year, JRI-Poland has been actively examining all previously created indices with an errata-seeking macro. This has delayed the uploading of funded data for some towns. Many town files are now in the process of being modified and those that are funded will be added to the database in the next data-processing sequence. We appreciate your patience.

We are listing the towns below followed by their Gubernia code (the first two letters of the name of their Gubernia) so that you can focus your search by Gubernia. Do **not** search by Town name as this will not generate results! For hints on maximizing your search results by using geographic coordinates, please refer to: http://www.jri-poland.org/hints_strategies.htm

If you have questions about the specific years and types of records in the database

for your town, go to the "Your Town" feature on the JRI-Poland website at www.jri-poland.org. You will find links there to your Town Leader or Shtetl CO-OP Coordinator who will be able to help answer your questions.

ITALIAN GEN DATABASE NOW HAS NEW YORK DEATH CERTIFICATE INDEX

I want to point out that our Italian (and other) cousins at the Italian Genealogical

Group have continued to add to their databases, which now includes death indices for New York City through 1948 and covers all the death certificates available at the New York City Municipal Archives.

Thanks to them we can now almost always get death certificate numbers and then order the certificates from the Municipal Archives without worrying whether the clerks can locate it — and do it from home.

NEW YORK CITY BRIDE'S AND GROOM'S INDEXES

Stephen P. Morse Completes Linking of New York Bride and Groom Indexes

The Stephen P. Morse site at http://stevemorse.org now has crosslinks between the bride and groom indexes for New York City located at the Italian Genealogy Group site at http://www.italiangen.org. After locating a man in the groom's index, there is a link to the index of the bride's record. Similarly, searching for a woman in the bride index provides a link to the groom index.

The groom index is for the entire city (1909-1936). The bride index is only for the boroughs of Bronx (1891-1937), Brooklyn (1891-1937) and Queens (1904-1937). Plans call for adding the Manhattan bride index to the online system. The bride index is incomplete.

Ancestry.com plans to announce shortly an every-name index to the 1910 census. When available it will mean that all the national U.S. censuses from 1790-1930 will have every-name indexes as well as images of the pages.

ARCHIVEGRID - RESEARCH LIBRARIES GROUP LAUNCHED

The Research Libraries Group has launched ArchiveGrid. "ArchiveGrid contains nearly a million archival collection descriptions held by hundreds of libraries, archives and museums."

"A search result page includes a list of archive collections, a summary of the archives and archive locations that are represented in the collections, as well as a search box that enables the user to limit a search to a particular date range, an archive and/or the location of the archives. The description of each collection includes a title, the name of the archive, and some brief information from its description. Each entry also shows the users' search terms in context. The user can discover what archives have material on the topic by reviewing the summary of archives and archive location. Researchers who want more

information about the archive or who want to contact it can click on the name of the archive in the collection description. The archive's name is linked to the ArchiveGrid database of archive information."

THE GODFREY LIBRARY

There is a turmoil brewing at the Godfrey Memorial Library. While the physical building is located in Middletown, CT, many of the members, known as "Godfrey Scholars," access resources of the library via the internet at http://www.godfrey.org/ Membership is a modest \$35 per year. The current uproar centers on the discontinuation of access to HeritageQuest U.S. census records for new members and all current members by the end of 2006. It is not clear whether HQ dropped the Godfrey or the other way around.

The Godfrey Memorial Library was founded by Fremont Rider. It was Incorporated in 1947. The mission statement of the library is to provide a "...free public library of books, pamphlets, periodicals and other materials in the fields of American biography and genealogy and in related fields; to carry on and promote investigation and research in these fields and to publish the results thereof..."

In 1951, the library opened its doors and stacks. About ten years ago, the Board of Trustees agreed to the creation of an internet website for online access on a subscription basis.

Regardless of the actual facts in this recent matter, the Godfrey Library online offers links to many free sites and for members, to many additional paid resources. I have only been a Godfrey Scholar for less than a month. In that short time, I have spent dozens of hours pouring over the resources available on the site. I have been able to add spouse and children's names, birthdates, addresses, phone numbers and other details to complete my database. I have had enormous success using a resource called *FindUSA*. This is a search engine that generates a consolidated report that is very helpful in locating missing relatives or completing details about others. The report includes: full name, DOB, addresses for the past 30+ years; property records; court records; links to every person who lived at those addresses for the past 30 years and much more. Typical reports provide links to individuals; their parents; spouses; adult children.

Another resource that has provided interesting information is the *ProQuest Historical Newspapers*. Using this resource, I located two cousins by first identifying their names in their father's obituary and then following up after locating an engagement announcement for one of the sons. The newspapers are digital; every word searchable. The included newspapers are: *Atlanta Constitution (1868-1925)*, *Boston Globe (1872-1901)*, *Chicago Tribune (1890-1982)*, *Los Angeles Times (1881-1984)*, *New York Times (1857-2002)*, and Washington Post (1877-1988).

PUBLIC RECORDS ACCESS AND MONITORING COMMITTEE: NJ, NJ, COLORADO

This is an update on legislation that would prevent access to vital records in New Jersey. New Jersey AB 1390 removes vital records (birth, marriage, domestic partnership, death and fetal death records) from the definition of public records, thereby making access to such records very difficult, if not impossible. Another bill, as currently drafted, would also prevent anyone including genealogists from sharing, selling, reproducing or disclosing information contained in the vital record. If enacted, this means genealogists could not share information obtained from the vital records with relatives or other genealogists.

IAJGS is talking with the sponsors of the bill to try to get it amended to permit genealogical copies, but we need your voices to the legislators to help us achieve our goal. IAJGS has prepared a model letter for people to write to the bill sponsors and their legislators about permitting genealogical copies.

New Hampshire HB 1382 would have prohibited a public or private entity from disclosing an individual's personal information without the individual's consent. The bill defined an individual to include a deceased individual. I am delighted to inform you that I was informed by the New Hampshire House Judiciary Committee staff that New Hampshire HB 1382 was KILLED in committee by a 17-0 vote. No further action will occur.

Recently I posted that we had lost the battle on Colorado HB 1357 on retaining access to marriage application information- which includes information that is not included on the actual marriage license—access to marriage licenses were not affected by this bill. Due to the fantastic efforts of the greater genealogical community that was reversed today on the floor of the Colorado Senate!

IAJGS worked very closely with the Colorado Genealogical Council in drafting our respective statements. We offered a compromise of opening the information to anyone, not just immediate family, 50 years from the event. While the Senate author at last week's Senate Judiciary Committee appeared to accept our compromise solution, the committee voted it down unanimously, due to opposition by the County Clerk's Association. However, today at its second reading on the floor the Senator Isgar, the author, who is also the Senate Minority Leader, introduced two amendments, both were accepted and passed its second reading. In addition to the genealogical community's 50 year proposal, he also introduced an amendment proposed by the private investigators, which helps everyone- anyone can apply to the district court, which may at its discretion and with good cause order that the marriage application be inspected. In effect, this provision affects those records less than 50 years from the date of the marriage application.

The bill still has to face its third reading on the Senate floor and then go back to the House floor for approval of the amended version before it goes to the governor. While we are not expecting any surprises, its not over until the bill passes as currently drafted and amended and is signed into law. You can follow the bill's progress at http:// www.leg.state.co.us/ click on House bills, click on range that covers HB 1357, click on go. The amended bill version should be posted on March 31.

FINDING BIRTHDATES AND RELATED PERSONS

Stephen P. Morse has added a "Finding Birthdates and Related Persons" portal to his site at http://stevemorse.org. It uses http://www.privateeye.com to identify contemporary Americans giving their name, town, state, and possibly birth date and names of other members of the household.

Such databases are useful for filling in the blanks about collateral relatives who are known only by name. These sites will provide their birthday, although such information can be inaccurate. Before relying on a birth date, make sure there are a number of hits for the name that corroborate the information. By providing the names of other members of the household, it may help fill in the blanks as to names of children and spouse. Then by searching for these individuals you can pick up their birth dates.

As noted in the last issue of *Nu? What's New?*, it can also be useful to locate women whose married surname is unknown. If you know the woman's birth date, searching this database for any person with a specific given name born on a specific date may provide you with the married name of the woman after analyzing the results.

If you have collateral lines with which you have little contact, use the Social Security Death Index to pick up death dates of persons and sites such as privateeye.com to acquire birth dates of these relatives. 15 Spring 2006
